# URBAN AND REGIONAL PLANNING MAJOR, BACHELOR OF ARTS (BA)

The department offers a Bachelor of Arts major and a 15 credit minor in urban and regional planning. The Bachelor of Arts major is a fully accredited professional degree that prepares the student for entry-level positions in planning.

Students majoring in planning may enter the program any time up to their third year of undergraduate studies. We also welcome transfers to enter as juniors. The Planning minor should be utilized by students majoring in other programs who perceive planning as a complement to their education.

In addition to the baccalaureate programs, the department also offers students the opportunity to earn dual degrees with other academic programs. In the past, students have earned concurrent degrees in geosciences, economics, sociology, and political science. Students from other programs may also take courses in the department.

Note: two years of a single high school world language or one year of a single college-level world language is required.
